





## **NESTED IN BELGRADE**

On this steep, sloping, and rocky site along a pond in the Belgrade Lakes region, the challenge was to create a contemporary year-round home that connects to the woods and water while working with the slope of the site rather than fighting against it.

Strewn across the site are massive boulders, remnants of receding glaciers from thousands of years ago that are now covered with moss and ferns. Instead of blasting them into pieces and hauling them away, the home was situated to nest among them.

The inverted floor plan features a main entry on the second floor and the primary living spaces on the lower level. These spaces are pushed forward toward the lake so that they sit low on the ground. They thus flow outside in a single step with lake views under the canopy of large pine trees. A tall, glazed stairwell links the two levels together and floods daylight into the rear spaces nested into the hill-side. To further blur the distinction between the home and its topography, all the lower roofs are planted and extend back into the hillside so that the house appears to be emerging from the landscape rather than piled on top of it.
